## Physiology 4710A: Physiology of the Senses

#### Fall Term 2015

This course covers the physiology of the senses in the primate, including touch, taste, pain, smell, vision, motion and hearing. Each sensory modality is used to exemplify a particular aspect of sensory processing from stimulus encoding at the periphery to the feature extraction in the sensory cerebral cortex. 2 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

#### 2. Each session consists of:

- Lectures are held in MSB 384 from 12:30 to 2:30 pm every Thursday. These present new material which forms the basic conceptual building blocks of each topic.
- Each week a series of problems are assigned based on the material covered. These problems allow you to review and extend the basic conceptual building blocks. It is very important that you use these problems to perfect your problem-solving skills. Students that have done poorly in previous years have admitted that they mindlessly click the mouse to find the correct answers and then memorize them. I promise you that you will need your problem-solving skills in the midterm and a final exam. Your memory will be of little help. In the problems you will learn that
  - there is more than one right answer
  - o but some right answers are better than others
  - o which is better can vary depending on circumstances
  - The question of <u>why manhole covers are typically round</u> was made famous by Microsoft and is a good example problemsolving.

- You can go over your solutions during a problem solving tutorial with your tutor, Brian Robertson, (Email .brober4@uwo.ca) and Nole Hiebert (Email: nole.hiebert@gmail.com)on Tuesdays or Wednesdays Natural Sciences Centre, Rm 7, 4:30 to 5:30 . But try all the problems on your own first before coming to the tutorials.. Make sure that you understand the reasons for why one answer was more correct and the others less correct or wrong. The first tutorials are on September 15 and 16
- A weekly OWL Quiz consisting of 3 to 5 multiple choice questions which must be completed in 15 min any time between 5:30pm to midnight every Wednesday. The first quiz is on Wednesday September 16.

#### **B.** Absence for non-medical reasons:

The student must discuss the nature of the non-medical reasons with Dr. Babwah. If the reason is of a private nature, the student will be referred to the Dean's Office and Dr. Babwah will act accordingly based on the Dean's advice. If documentation is required, such documentation must be submitted by the student directly to the appropriate Faculty Dean's Office and **not** to the instructor. It will subsequently be the Dean's Office that will determine if accommodation is warranted.

# C. Special Examinations

A Special Examination is any examination other than the regular examination, and it may be offered only with the permission of the Dean of the Faculty in which the student is registered, in consultation with the instructor and Department Chair. Permission to write a Special Examination may be given on the basis of compassionate or medical grounds with appropriate supporting documents.

A Special Examination must be written at the University or an Affiliated University College no later than 30 days after the end of the examination period involved. To accommodate unusual circumstances, a date later than this may be arranged at the time permission is first given by the Dean of the Faculty. The Dean will consult with the instructor and Department Chair and, if a later date is arranged, will communicate this to Registrarial Services. If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, permission to write another Special Examination will be granted only with the permission of the Dean in exceptional circumstances and with appropriate

supporting documents. In such a case, the date of this Special Examination normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time the course is offered.
