# 4. Course Description and Design

**Delivery Mode:** in-person

With recent technological advances, our understanding of the immune underpinnings of inflammatory and immunological diseases continues to evolve. In this course, students will explore modern perspectives that challenge existing paradigms of inflammatory diseases.

Antirequisite(s): the former Microbiology and Immunology 4300A.

Prerequisite(s): Microbiology and Immunology 3300B with a mark of at least 70%.

Extra Information: 3 lecture hours.

## 13. How to Be Successful in this Class

Students enrolled in this class should understand the level of autonomy and self-discipline required to be successful.

Examples of flexibility in assessment include when there are assessments not required for calculation of the final grade (e.g. 8 out of 10 quizzes) or there is flexibility in the submission timeframe (e.g. 72 hour no late penalty period).

Please note that any academic considerations granted in this course will be determined by the instructor of this course, in consultation with the academic advisors in your Faculty of Registration, in accordance with information presented in this course syllabus. Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness should use the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u> or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner.

Accommodation for Religious Holidays
