4. Course Description and Design

Delivery Mode: In-person

This course will cover the cellular and molecular mechanisms underlying the actions of drugs on the central nervous systems. Lectures will focus on recent developments in the field of neuroscience and their impact on our understanding of the actions, and development of, new drugs.

Prerequisite(s): Pharmacology 3620; Physiology 3140A; or permission of the Department.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

5. Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify critical aspects from research articles through in-class presentations and discussion as well as through an independent written report.
- Identify and describe different types of genetically modified mouse models (transgenics, knockouts, knock-ins) as well as different methodologies available to modulate neurotransmission (optogenetics, chemogenetics, etc) and their use on better understanding neurological diseases.
- Describe cellular and molecular mechanisms underlying diseases of the nervous system such as Parkinson disease and Schizophrenia, and mechanism of action of drugs used in the treatment.

Information about late or missed assessments:

- Late assessments without academic consideration will be subject to a late penalty of 10 %/day
- Students that missed the paper/clinical trial presentations discussion (not the group presentation) will receive a written make-up that should be completed within 72 hours after the missed presentation.
- Paper and clinical trial presentations must be complete and cover all relevant topics, even if a group member misses the presentation day.
- There will be one scheduled makeup midterm exam. In the case the makeup midterm is also missed with academic consideration, the weight of the midterm exam will be transferred to the final exam.
- A paper presentation (+ discussion), or a clinical trial presentation (+ discussion), and the final exam must be completed to pass the course. If one of these activities is missed, the student will receive an INC and complete the task the next time the course is offered

INC (Incomplete Standing): If a student has been approved by the Academic Advising Office (in consultation with the instructor/department) to complete term work at a later date, an INC will be assigned. Students with INC will have their course load in subsequent terms reduced to allow them to complete outstanding course work. Students may request permission from Academic Advising to carry a full course load for the term the incomplete course work is scheduled.

SPC (**Special examination**): If a student has been approved by the Academic Advising Office to write a Special Examination and the final exam is the only outstanding course component, an SPC will be assigned. If the class has a makeup exam, the student is expected to write the makeup exam. If the class doesn't have a makeup exam or the student misses the makeup exam for reasons approved by the Academic Advising Office, the student will write the exam the next time the course is offered. Outstanding SPCs will reduce the course load for the term the exam is deferred as outlined in Types of Examinations policy.

13. How to Be Successful in this Class

This designated assessment is described elsewhere in this document. Academic consideration requests may be denied when flexibility in assessment has already been included. Examples of flexibility in assessment include when there are assessments not required for calculation of the final grade (e.g. 8 out of 10 quizzes) or there is flexibility in the submission timeframe (e.g. 72 hour no late penalty period).

Please note that any academic considerations granted in this course will be determined by the instructor of this course, in consultation with the academic advisors in your Faculty of Registration, in accordance with information presented in this course syllabus. Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness should use the Student Medical Certificate or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner.

Accommodation for Religious Holidays

Generally, students can expect some form of feedback on their performance in a course before the drop date. Marks WILL NOT be bumped to the next grade or GPA, e.g., a 79 will NOT be bumped up to an 80, an 84 WILL NOT be bumped up to an 85, etc. The mark attained is the mark you achieved, and the mark assigned; requests for mark "bumping" will be denied.
