## 4. Course Description and Design

**Delivery Mode:** in-person

Cellular and molecular physiology is an exciting and rapidly changing area of biology. Physiology 4730B is a one-term half-course designed to introduce students to advanced concepts and current research focused on cell signaling pathways that regulate cellular function and promote survival, repair and regeneration. The models studied will include the nervous system and various peripheral systems and relevant pathologies with an emphasis on therapeutic approaches. Reference to published scientific literature will be used as appropriate. The format of the course will be a series of lectures on the selected topics introduced by two faculty members. Students are expected to be able to recall and critically evaluate facts, recognize general concepts, use new information to solve problems, be aware of the historical development of the research field, and be familiar with current literature and research methods. Students will also be responsible for presenting, critiquing and discussing research papers in group formats.

Pre-requisite course: Physiology 3120

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

- Define key signaling pathways involved in the response to injury
- Apply knowledge of cell signaling pathways to suggest novel therapeutic strategies for enhancing tissue repair after injury.
- Define key concepts in tissue regeneration/repair and the limitations of current strategies.
- Analyze and interpret data from literature publications in the area of tissue injury and repair and explain the methods used to generate data.

#### Information about late or missed assessments:

- One make-up test will be offered for midterm exam – the date will be determined but will occur within one week of regular exam unless extenuating circumstances.
- If a student is unable to present on the assigned date then their presentation group will be assigned to a later date if possible. Otherwise, the student group will present to the instructor outside of regular class hours at an arranged time & date.
- Student presentation, midterm exam, and final exam must be completed and passed to pass the course. If any of these elements are not completed and passed, the student will be given an INC and student will need to complete the element(s) the next time the course is offered.

**INC (Incomplete Standing):** If a student has been approved by the Academic Advising Office (in consultation with the instructor/department) to complete term work at a later date, an INC will be assigned. Students with INC will have their course load in subsequent terms reduced to allow them to complete outstanding course work. Students may request permission from Academic Advising to carry a full course load for the term the incomplete course work is scheduled.

**SPC (Special examination):** If a student has been approved by the Academic Advising Office to write a Special Examination and the final exam is the only outstanding course component, an SPC will be assigned.
