4. Course Description and Design

Delivery Mode: In person

The hypothalamus and limbic system contribute to the neural integration of autonomic, endocrine and skeletomotor responses which contribute to homeostasis and adaptive behaviours. Topics include the regulation of neuroendocrine function, blood pressure, energy and water balance, circadian rhythms and the integration of reproductive function.

Prerequisite(s): Physiology 3120 and 3140A; OR Neuroscience 2000 and Physiology 3140A and registration in Year 4 of an Honours Specialization in Neuroscience.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

5. Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- explain the definition of homeostasis in physiology and describe examples of physiological homeostasis regulations and their underlying neurophysiology, through in class discussions as well as written exams and assignments.
- deliver key findings and critique limitations of primary research papers through in class discussions and independent written summary reports.
- explain some in depth examples of physiological regulations relevant to homeostasis (e.g. hypertension, obesity, stress and sleep apnea), and to assess research publications in these fields by student-driven presentations and discussions.
- evaluate scientific literature and synthesize concepts to create a literature review about the neural regulation of homeostasis and stress response.

- Rubrics will be used to evaluate assessments and will be posted with the instructions
- Group presentation (3 students/group) will prepare 20 min presentation for specific research paper assigned to individual groups, followed by 20 min discussion.
- Discussion leader will lead/MC the discussion, by preparing questions, discussion points etc.
- For group presentation and discussion leader, a student might not receive the same grade as their group members if it is determined that the distribution of work was not equal
- After an assessment is returned, students should wait 24 hours to digest feedback before contacting their evaluator; to ensure a timely response, reach out within 7 days
- Any grade appeals on assignments, presentations or midterms must be received within 3 weeks of the grade being posted.

Information about late or missed assessments:

Late assessments without academic consideration will be subject to a late penalty (after 72 h no late penalty period in the assignments specified above) 10%/day

- An assessment cannot be submitted after it has been returned to the class. This policy applies to missed in-class presentation and discussion leader. One make-up test will be offered on a specific date.
- All course assessment (Midterm & final exams, presentations and discussions, lay summaries) must be completed to pass the course.

INC (Incomplete Standing): If a student has been approved by the Academic Advising Office (in consultation with the instructor/department) to complete term work at a later date, an INC will be assigned. Students with INC will have their course load in subsequent terms reduced to allow them to complete outstanding course work. Students may request permission from Academic Advising to carry a full course load for the term the incomplete course work is scheduled.

Please note that any academic considerations granted in this course will be determined by the instructor of this course, in consultation with the academic advisors in your Faculty of Registration, in accordance with information presented in this course syllabus. Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness should use the Student Medical Certificate or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner.

Marks WILL NOT be bumped to the next grade or GPA, e.g., a 79 will NOT be bumped up to an 80, an 84 WILL NOT be bumped up to an 85, etc. The mark attained is the mark you achieved, and the mark assigned; requests for mark "bumping" will be denied.
