Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to provide the basic skills and resources in evidence-based medicine, grant writing, research ethics, research methodology and design, and principles of clinical trials.

Learning Objectives:

By the end of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Select the appropriate study design based on your research question.
- 2. Develop an understanding of surgical research principles.
- 3. Critically appraise surgical scientific research.
- 4. Effectively communicate your research results through both written and oral communication.
- 5. Understand the importance of ethical guidelines when designing research studies.
- 6. Build your knowledge and understanding of surgical research principles.

Course Administration:

The course begins on September 16, 2024 and is scheduled to end on April 7, 2025. Class material is all posted in OWL Brightspace. There will be synchronous sessions on zoom for this course. The zoom class session meeting notices are on the OWL site for the course.

This course is a mandatory requirement of the MSc in Surgery Program. You will be required to sign and acknowledge that you are aware that the synchronous class sessions begin at either 3 or 4 PM. Being late is not acceptable unless a valid reason is provided in advance.
